What a year it has been! As we completed our 5th year with Rubaroo we realised how much we've learnt and grown with it and we're proud to say that we feel like we've come a long way. One of the things we had been wanting for some time was to be more self-reliant and our fifth year was a lesson in that. In our push for independence, we naively failed to estimate how scary it would be. Nevertheless, through the hiccups of self-doubt, fear of failure and anxiety, we achieved the highest outreach we've ever had in a month, officially started with ATMA for their Accelerator programme, ran a brilliant campaign at the Tata Mumbai Marathon and started working with stakeholders such as lawyers, government agencies and judges through the prestigious Delhi Judicial Academy. We've built a fantastic team of committed individuals and have a wonderful and ever-growing set of supporters who have always come through when called upon. We realised that we would, despite the inhibitions, keep working hard for this for the cause that is ohso-important to us. Never in our wildest of dreams did we ever think that in the last month of the year we would be struck by a pandemic. It has affected so many lives and brought about great vulnerability for various individuals and sections of society. Hence, we would like to use this note to make a few personal appeals.

Children form a great part of this vulnerable population and we are striving to do our best to safeguard them. Reports have indicated that the rate of abuse within homes has increased exponentially. To add to that, the lockdown situation and minimal to no access to help or services has rendered a feeling of helplessness. Yet, we will not give up our fight against child sexual abuse. If anything, we are devising new ways to tackle this problem, a silent epidemic in its own right. We would, however, like to use this note to make a few personal appeals.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Firstly, your support is what has kept Rubaroo going and allowed us to save children. Now, more than ever before, we need this support to remain unwavering so that we can continue to fight knowing that we have a solid backing of people who care about children and their safety. We hope you will find it in your hearts to continue be kind and generous as you have been in the past. The safety of children depends on all of us.

Secondly, as we see the effects of Covid permeating into every area of society, we see a manifold increase in gender based violence. The lockdown situation and restricted movement has allowed more powerful individuals to abuse their power, be it in the forms of domestic violence or child sexual abuse. We urge you to engage with us on our platforms to become a part of a solution to inhibit the growth of this increased violence. Every voice counts, and every voice has the power to bring about a shift in attitudes. It may be many years before we see the change we hope to see, but we urge you to be a part of this change by educating yourself through our platforms about this power imbalance and how it can be made equitable. CSA thrives in such an environment, we need to work harder and with greater ferocity to prevent the rise of a trauma afflicted population of children. The very health, wellbeing and balance in society depends on this. The Covid has brought upon all of us very trying times, let us continue to hold on to kindness, empathy and perseverance, to create and maintain a society that provides for safe and happy children.

We hope you will enjoy reading this report as much as we enjoyed preparing it. Take pride in the fact that you have been a part of our journey and successes.








OUR IMPACT



We do pre and post tests with all the children, from standard 5th to 10th, to gauge the impact of our programme. We try to assess the positive knowledge and attitude shift related to personal safety and gender sensitivity of the children with these tests. There are five elements that we analyze, with regards to personal safety. The data consists of responses from a total of 1234 children from standards 8 to 10 and 761 children from standards 5 to 7. The following are the results.


1. ABILITY TO IDENTIFY PRIVATE BODY PARTS




2. UNDERSTANDING OF BODY BOUNDARIES



3. ABLITY TO SPEAK UP FOR THEMSELVES AND OTHERS ABOUT PERSONAL SAFETY




4. KNOWLEDGE ABOUT SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS







GENDER SENSITIVITY



In an anonymous survey with 2760 children (From standard 3th to 10th), we found out that 20.11% of children have faced an unsafe situation.

Overall first-aid counselling given by us to children across all age group is 174. (Immediate intervention with those children who have faced an unsafe situation)

SUCCESS STORIES

First Ever Gender Sensitivity Program with Hearing and Speech Impaired Individuals

In May 2019 we conducted our first ever gender sensitivity programme with hearing and speech impaired individuals. This programme was well received as reflected in students' facial expressions, general level of attentiveness and enthusiasm.

Positive Student Feedback

In September 2019, a student commented that it was helpful that Rubaroo conducts a programme for parents as it had encouraged his own parents to come forward as trusted adults, by checking with him if he was ever in an unsafe situation. This was a valuable feedback from the student, as it suggests that our mandatory parents sessions are effective and fulfills our aim of spreading awareness around child sexual abuse.



SUCCESS STORIES

Students Becoming Safety Advocates

In February 2020, after a CSA awareness programme, a parent told us that the reason she ensured that she came to this programme was because her child explained everything that was taught to her in the MBMS programme as well as taught her younger sibling the same. This was encouraging to hear, as it indicates that students are able to discuss what they have learned during the programme with their parents and trusted adults, thus facilitating open communication between them.

One of our Partner School took the initiative to appoint a Protection Officer

In June 2019, one of the schools at which we conducted our programme, took a great step for child safety by appointing a protection officer for students and posted their number on a wall in the main office along with Childline's helpline number



SUCCESS STORIES

A Successful Individual Intervention

In one of the individual sessions, a girl disclosed to our team member that she was in a relationship with an older boy, who sometimes made her feel unsafe. The girl further explained that her parents might stop her education if they found out that she was in a relationship. Breaking up with the boyfriend did not seem like an option to her because he was threatening to make their relationship public. Through intense therapy over the next couple of days, the child seemed to understand and acknowledged that the she wanted to end the relationship. Our team member provided her with emergency resources and their personal information to reach out to for SOS help and helped her understand that for her safety it's important to involve an adult in the process. A year later, the girl reached out to us and shared that she first broke up with the boyfriend soon after we had spoken to her the previous year. She also shared that she eventually managed to reach out to her elder sister and then her mother for support and with their help she explained the situation to her father. She was also able to convince her parents to let her continue her education. She said, "It wasn't easy, my father still doesn't talk to me but I know that things will get back to normal. I am happy that I am safe and I can reach out to my trusted adults"
